Treasurer's Report

The attached financial statement for the 2013 / 2014 financial year for the 12th Rugby (Christ Church) Scout Group. (See the Financial Appendix for the full breakdown)

Account 1 - Community Account

Subscriptions

The group has seen a steady membership roll during the year. The membership generates the revenue to finance the Group for the 'day to day' costs, which with our new headquarters will cover utility costs, census return, insurance for the building and contents, resources, materials, badges etc.

Subscription revenue amounted to £5836."

Fundraising

An excellent year for fundraising. A flurry of grants and fundraising has enabled the building fund target to be met. Significant grants have been made by Rugby Borough Council, Rugby Benevolent Fund, and DHL. Fundraising activities such as quiz eveneings, buy-a-brick scheme, and the annual firework event have made significant contributions.

Trips, Activities, Camps

All sections have enjoyed a broad spectrum of trips and camps.

Capital Purchases

Some capital purchases were made, mainly to replace camping equipment or to provide needed facilities in the headquarters.

Account 2 - Business Money Management

Beaver Report

We are currently running with 28 Beavers (25 boys and 3 girls). We have a waiting list of 5 children, who are not old enough to start yet. There are 3 leaders; Ella (also ADC Beavers), Richard and myself.

We have spent a lot of time working on Challenge badges which enables most beavers to gain their Bronze Award before they move to Cubs. These include their Friendship, Global, Promise, Fitness and Outdoor badges.

The Beavers have also completed their Air Activities, Creative, Imagination, Experiment and Health and Fitness badges. April saw the introduction of new Beaver badges, and we have already started on the Gardeners, Camp Craft and Communicators badges. We also finished the 1st Stage of the Emergency Aid badge.

As a Colony we have taken part in many District events, including an Imagination badge afternoon and an "Around the World" Funday (as part of their International Partnership Award, with the District collecting pennies in Smarties tubes, which were then donated to Child Aid Uganda). Last December also saw the 12th Beavers host the District Beaver Carol Service at Christ Church Brownsover. 15 Beavers attended the St Georges day parade.

In May the Beavers joined almost 500 other Beavers and their leaders from across the county at Coombe Abbey for a County Funday. The Beavers also joined the rest of the 12th in a group visit to the Birmingham ThinkTank. 9 Beavers attended our group camp, and this July will see the first Rugby District Beaver Camp at Ullesthorpe Campsite. We currently have 17 Beavers attending.

We continue to attend the monthly Parade Services. We would like to see our numbers at the services increase next year.

We end the year with one of the Cubs favourite activities - a Cub pack camp to Blackwell Adventure.

We have worked on a lot of badges, including the Promise Challenge and Global activity and challenge badges. The Cubs had a lot of fun finding out about renewable energy and water filtration systems.

22 Cubs completed their Chefs badge, which was achieved with help from our Explorer young Leader and three parents who gave up their time to come in and help the children cook

As part of the DIY badge, some of the children made wooden bookends. The children also built a picnic bench. Once again this could not have been achieved without the help and support of parents.

Some of the children completed their World Faiths badge; they covered many religions and faiths. We had visitors come in to talk to them about their faiths and religion. Three Cubs also completed the My Faith badge.

As part of their backwoods cooking and fire safety, the Cubs had a lot of fun learning to start a fire safely, what they could use, and how to build one. They toasted bread, fried up sausage, eggs and beans, made damper bread and a dessert all on pit fires.

The 12th Rugby Cub pack have had a very successful year thanks to the help and support of parents and adult volunteers. Thank you All.

Continuing our links with other Troops in the district, we joined 7th Bilton on a great sailing day at Northampton Sailing Club. We also joined 5th Newbold and 7th Bilton on a competitive ice camp at Ullesthorpe. No one froze, all the Scouts performed well, and we came joint 1st with Newbold!

Hut Report

We have now been in the new headquarters for approximately 9 months. The relationship with the school and RATS is very positive. There remains circa £15k of loans which need to be repaid and fundraising events are being planned to do this. Your support with these events is both welcome and appreciated.

The building is also being used by the local community more, and these room hires help contribute to the overall running cost of the building. The running costs are comparable, if not slightly less than the group used to pay at the old community centre, but the new building has significant other advantages; e.g. Control over building use, better storage, own grounds which provide an excellent area for scouting activities, and access to the school grounds should these be needed.

A hut maintenance and management group meet on the first Sunday of the month to carry out routine maintenance. Anybody who can help please contact a leader.

There are ongoing plans to build a trailer store next to the new storage container, complete the raised beds and eventually fit solar panels when the finances allow.
